Quarterly Report (October – December 2012)

Project Title: Towards Empowerment of Women Farmers in Vidarbha

PIA: MS Swaminathan Research Foundation, Chennai

Following is a brief account of the work done in the project during the quarter, October-December 2012, on various thematic areas:

1. Institution Building:

1) Formation of new women farmers groups:

During October to December 2012, a total of 9 women farmers groups have been formed bringing 147 women farmers under the programme fold. The programme covers 1963 members in the districts of Wardha and Yavatmal as on December 2012.

2) Capacity Building of Women Farmers:

Capacity building programmes in the theme of Institution Building were organised at three levels- village, cluster and district. Awareness sessions on various entitlements available through government schemes as well as on salient features of Panchayati Raj institution were imparted to women farmers. Further, trainings and demonstrations on interface with government officials were also given to the community resource persons (CRPs) and office bearers of the women farmer groups. Trainings were held at the

district headquarters for CRPS; at the cluster level for office bearers; and at the village level for women farmers.

- a) Collective Reading of Magazines: Annual subscriptions for two magazines are in place and all the women farmers' groups are receiving the fortnightly, *Panchayat Bharati* and tri-monthly *Sakhi*. Women farmers have begun the process of reading the magazines collectively. These two magazines focus on issues related Panchayati Raj Institutions and women's Rights.
- b) Skill building on Liaisoning and Interface: The members' confidence on engaging with the representatives of local administration and officials of line departments were built through a series of awareness and training programmes. Members were educated on the functions of the local administration and the different line departments. They were also made aware of the various schemes and entitlements handled by these agencies. A one to one interaction with the officials of the different line departments with the women farmers was arranged. The major focus of this meeting was on educating women farmers on their entitlement and the procedure to access these entitlements. Women farmers were provided knowledge on the process of bringing up grievances and they were also oriented on the contact persons in each department to be approached to submit grievances. 145 women farmers from 26 groups and 15 villages participated in these exercises during the period.
- c) Village level awareness meeting on Entitlements and Federation Formation: Village level meetings were conducted for providing information on government schemes and the concept of federation formation. These meetings were held across 42 villages attended by 668 women farmers belonging to 80 groups.
- d) <u>Awareness on Panchayati Raj</u>: Following this 7 village level awareness camps on Panchayat Raj was conducted in which 108 members from 11 groups participated.
- e) Monthly meetings with CRPs and VRPs: Regular meetings were held every month to share experiences, discuss difficulties, snags, successes and plan future activities for the CRPs and VRPs. One-day workshop was organised for CRPs on 3rd December 2012 at Yatri Niwas with a focus on training CRPs on organizational issues related to village events.

2. Sustainable Agriculture:

A crop life cycle approach is taken on scheduling the capacity building programmes under this head. Major aspects covered during the quarter October-December 2012 is

Integrated Pest Management. The process followed for capacity building is awareness creation using various audio-visual tools and print materials followed by field level demonstration for skill training.

- a) <u>Training on integrated pest management practices to staff and CRPs</u>: During the reporting period one training session was conducted on integrated pest management practices at the district level. Training comprised of awareness creation, skill training and demonstration. This training was attended by 9 staff members and 18 CRPs.
- b) Village level awareness meeting: During the reporting period 3 village level meetings were conducted in 3 villages by para professionals with the help CRPs and VRPs to create awareness on the ill effects of pesticide on human health as well as on integrated pest management practices. Two CDs were used for this purpose: Satya mev Jayte and module on IPM. 55 members from 6 women farmers groups participated.

General awareness on sustainable agricultural practices was also created across 52 villages in which 770 members from 90 groups participated.9. As regards adoption of sustainable agricultural practices, it is important to note that 305 yellow sticky traps to 76 members and 225 pheromone trap to 72 members and 58 bird stands were distributed to women farmers during this quarter. Beside this, neem *asthra* is prepared and used by a minimum of 4 women farmers in each village.

c) <u>Demonstrations</u>: To demonstrate the standard practices of preparation of neem and bramha *asthra*, as well as seed treatment, germination and various trap use practices meetings were conducted at village level. Details are as below:

- d) <u>Functioning of Common Facility Centres</u>: The Centres are proving to be highly useful as regards timely availability of farm implements for the members as well as for other villagers. Experience of the centres over September to December indicate that on an average 31 farmers in Lonsawali and 27 farmers in Sonegaon Bai borrow some implement or other in the course of a month. Separate saving bank accounts have been opened for the common facility centres.
- e) Animal Husbandry: Three cattle vaccination camps were organized at village level in collaboration with the Govt. Veterinary Hospital. A total of 234 cattle were vaccinated against foot and mouth diseases in these camps. About 121 of our women farmers, belonging to four women farmers' groups, had benefitted by these camps. In addition to our members other villagers had also participated and gained.
- f) Knowledge Connectivity: Gram Warta newsletter produced by the Village Resource Centre of MSSRF was distributed to 86 samitis. Two phone in programmes in the theme of general crop management and pest and disease management were conducted by MSSRF Village Resource Centres at Waifad and Yavatmal. A need assessment workshop was conducted to get specific feedback from women farmers on voice messages and other connectivity related issues.

3. Household Food and Nutrition Security:

- a) Awareness on food and nutrition security: During reporting period village level meeting were conducted to create awareness on household food and nutrition security aspects: safe cooking appliances, safe drinking water, sanitation, health and kitchen garden practices. 753 women farmers from 93 women farmers' groups participated in the village level meetings.
- **b)** <u>Demonstrations</u>: To demonstrate the Kitchen garden layout techniques, village level meetings were conducted in 25 villages. 250 participants from 25 women farmers' groups attended the demonstration/meetings.
- c) Seed distribution and storage: During the reporting period seeds were distributed to 186 members to raise kitchen garden. Another 123 women farmers received seeds of wheat and 90 women farmers received seeds of chana for cultivation in *rabi* season. Community seed storage was initiated during this quarter. 25 varieties of seeds were collected from 104 women farmers.
- **d**) <u>Sarai cooker distribution</u>: During the reporting period 208 *sarai* cookers were distributed at a subsidised rate to women farmers

- e) <u>Health camp</u>: During the reporting period 8 health camps were organized in 8 villages in collaboration with the Primary Health Centres. Basic health parameters were tested and reported for 118 women farmers from 12 women farmers' groups. In addition, 48 non-members also underwent the tests.
- f) <u>Diet Display</u>: In Bodad village, diet display was organised in which 13 members participated. Nutritious dishes were cooked and displayed by members and a nutrition expert talked to the members on the importance of nutritious food.

IV) Other Activities Related to Project Implementation:

- a) <u>Baseline Survey</u>: Baseline survey is in progress and up to this quarter, collection of information from 1611 women farmers has been completed.
- b) <u>Monitoring and Evaluation</u>: For systematic monitoring of the functioning of MKSP a sample has been drawn. Monitoring tools have been canvassed in the selected households.
- c) <u>Programme Advisory Committee Meeting</u>: The second programme advisory committee meeting was held on the 10th of November, 2012 at CICR, Nagpur. The meeting was chaired by Prof M S Swaminathan. The meeting was attended by all committee members, except Dr Sheetal Amte and Dr Kranti. Representatives from MoRD, NABARD, Bank of India as well as government officials from Wardha district attended the meeting. The meeting was followed by a field trip to Sonegon Bai village where a Common Facility Centre has been functioning. Nearly 300 women farmers had gathered to welcome the dignitaries in the village.
